First-Gen Alumni: Darrick Smith (Oakes, sociology '96)

Darrick is currently an assistant professor of educational leadership at the University of San Francisco. In 1992, Darrick Smith graduated from high school. In that same year, his hometown of Oakland had 175 homicides.

At that time, the social problems in his city were making international headlines.

Smith made up his mind to do something about this grim statistic. In his sophomore year, he dedicated his attention to exploring solutions to the bloodshed and desperation that had plagued what he calls his "beautiful and powerful city".


